We are confident that we will meet the challenges that the future holds for us, and our objectives and achievements we want to reach are encouraging to continue working for a better Paraguay.

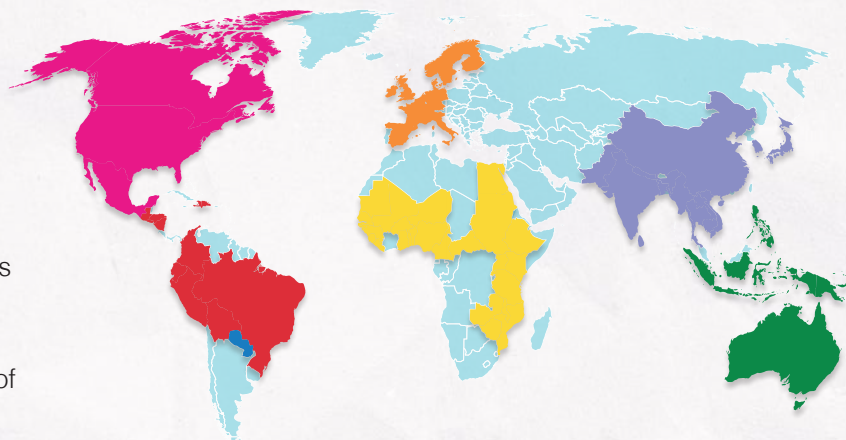
The results presented below have been possible thanks to the leadership as Country Directors of Lorena de Garcia and Leticia Pereira, whom we thank and acknowledge.

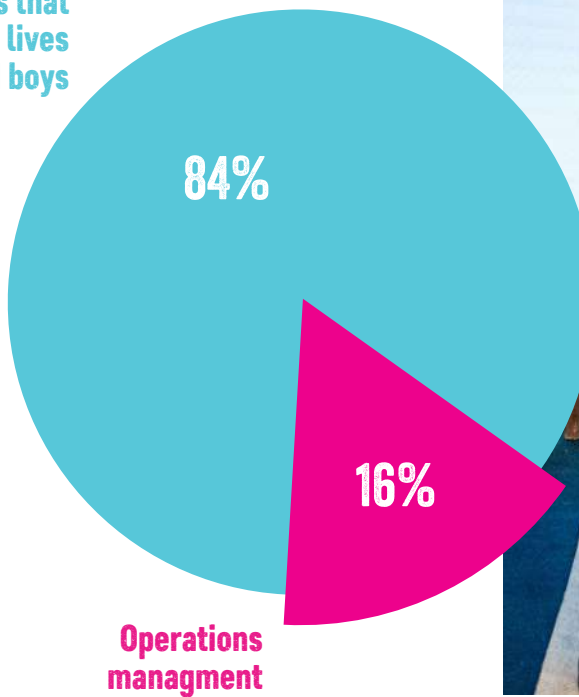

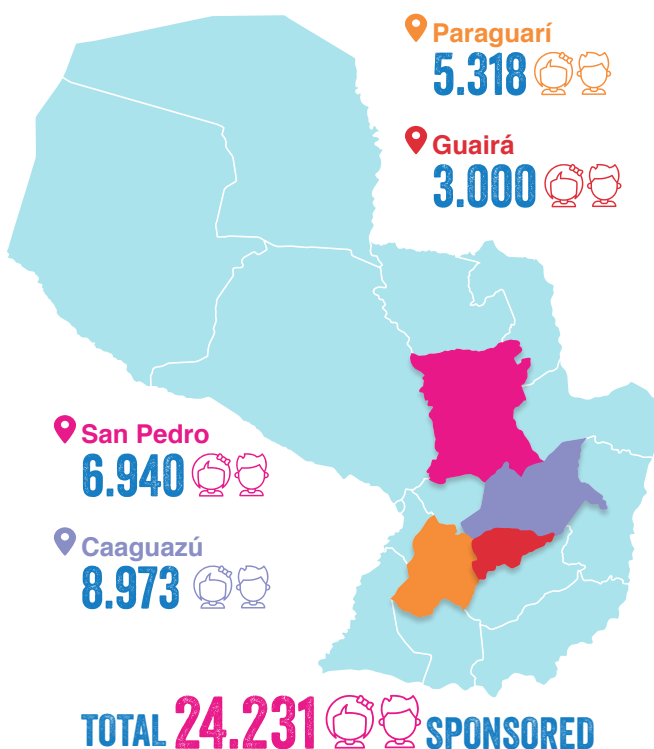


CHILD SPONSORSHIP

Through child sponsorship, a sponsor has the opportunity to support the most vulnerable populations in the world.

The sponsorship system provides a sponsor with the opportunity to make monetary donations to benefit children in rural communities. The sponsor receives updates from his or her sponsored child, often including photos and letters that help to develop a relationship between them.

Income from child sponsorship make it possible to implement quality programs in the community where the sponsored child lives.

Income from grants are not spent directly on the sponsored child, but are added to other income to finance various education, health, security and other projects, benefiting the whole community.

Sponsored children are introduced as ambassadors in their own communities. They come from the most vulnerable families, and therefore it is key that Plan International's programs are targeted them and provide them with community-based development solutions in which they and their families can participate.

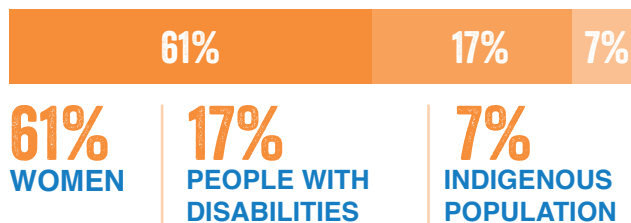

Flexible Model for Youth



We seek innovative solutions to improve the quality of life of youth, by carrying out specific actions to achieve lasting results for this population.

Project funded by Plan International Sweden.



We support collective actions led by youth themselves to strengthen the guarantee of their rights, particularly those of girls and young women, through transformative actions.

Two youth organizations were selected as partners.



Cinecable Association

This is a youth organization that works with cinema as a means of expression for social change, artistic expression and dissemination of human rights. Working in the southern city of Encarnacion, they carried out a project called “El desafío de Gaby - capítulo 2” [Gaby’s challenge - chapter 2], as a continuation of a short film already made, which seeks to inform about gender equality and to break down prejudices and oppressive traditions.

This project also allowed them to work on internal institutional strengthening, and internal reflection and generation of a strategic plan with the mission and vision they intend to achieve as a youth organization.



**Corazones Abiertos
[Open Hearts]**

Organization that promotes youth volunteering in Paraguay and seeks to promote solidarity as a way of life. They proposed the “Homes” project, which seeks to map alternative care centres that house children and adolescents across the country.

The “Homes” project aims to share contact information about the alternative care centers to which individuals, entities, private companies, etc., can address their intentions of help or corporate social responsibility. More than 90% of those homes are supported by solidarity contributions from private entities and the State. They are also working on the design and layout of the “hogares.com” website, where they will publish collected data.

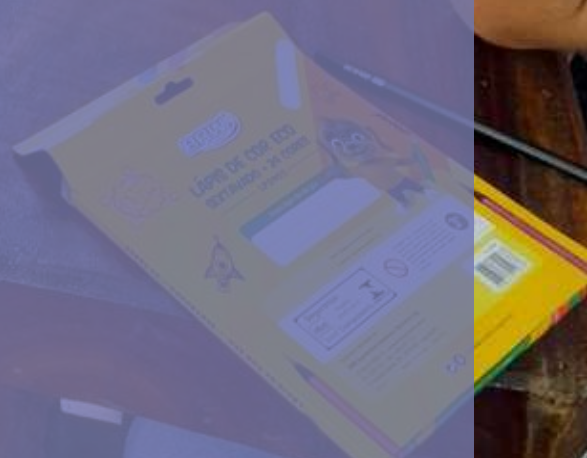

Other results of the DECIDE program

1. **A network of experiences in comprehensive health education** through art was created through community meetings.

They benefited:

140 adolescents.

110 parents and caregivers

2. **The Ministry of Public Health and Social Welfare implemented the “pregnancy-free zones” methodology**, training 1,277 male and female adolescents in the departments of San Pedro, Caaguazu, Guaira and Paraguari. They also adopted the adolescent APP and made it part of its website.

3. **The Ministry of Education adjusted the “psychosocial support” materials** as a strategy for the promotion of mental health to prevent, care and address violated rights of children and adolescents in emergency educational contexts.

4. **The Ministry of Public Health and Social Welfare presented the first guide in the country on “Comprehensive Health Care for Adolescents with Disabilities”**. This guide was used for training health personnel in the departments of San Pedro, Caaguazu, Guaira and Paraguari.

5. **211 adolescents and youth participated in the First National Congress for Adolescents and Youth “For a healthy youth”**.

Positive Parenting

It aims to encourage parents and caregivers to incorporate nurturing practices that ensure violence-free environments.

In partnership with the Itaú Foundation , we seek to develop a comprehensive educational environment for children and adolescents in basic education, mitigating the risk of school dropout during the 2022-2023 school year, in the districts of María Antonia and Ybytymí.

Thanks to the donation of folk guitars and national dance costumes, children and adolescents improved their attendance and participation in the classroom, through artistic and cultural activities.

Scholarship Program

The University scholarship program for young men and women aims to improve education by providing financial support to young people in the Department of San Pedro and is funded by Mr Terry Nelidov, a US-based sponsor.

In 2011, Plan International and other organisations advocated worldwide for establishing an International Day of the Girl to recognize the rights of girls and the challenges they face. In December of that same year The United Nations General Assembly declared October 11 as International Day of the Girl

TAKEOVERS

Since 2016 in Paraguay, girls took over positions of top authorities in several state institutions, embassies, cooperation agencies, private companies and in the media.

The girls participating in the experience stated that the takeover is a symbolic act to show the world that girls do exist, have capabilities and that, if they have opportunities, they can take over and enhance their leadership.

Girls take over positions in which they are often not seen or heard and strengthen every girl's right to equal opportunities with boys and adults.

In 2021, with the slogan #ConectadasSeguras, we wanted to highlight the limited access to the Internet for girls and young women, and the misinformation and fake news they are exposed to when they are online.

SWe know that during the pandemic, technology has been key to continuing education and maintaining social interaction.

However, digital inequalities have increased significantly, especially for girls, women and other groups that were already vulnerable before Covid-19.

INVISIBLE IN FULL LIGHT CHILD MARRIAGES AND FORCED AND EARLY UNIONS

Child marriages and forced and early unions (CMFEU) refer to any formal marriage or informal union where one or both parties are under 18 years of age.

They represent a multidimensional problem: sociocultural, educational, economic, legal, and health, among others, which is confronted by weak public institutions, lack of access to rights and lack of protection for a large proportion of children and adolescents across the country. They also represent a form of violence against children and adolescents.

A research was conducted in Asunción and in the departments of Central, San Pedro, Caaguazú, Alto Paraná and Amambay.

The findings clearly show that there is a close relation between early unions, pregnancy, poverty and school dropout and that these are factors that condition girls and adolescents to lose opportunities, give up their life projects and reproduce such conditioning factors.



ABOUT THE CAMPAIGN

The research was released in a communication campaign and shared results in Santaní, Caaguazú, Asunción and Villarrica, mainly with representatives of the Judicial System.

The national campaign

#TodosSomosResponsables calls for attention and urges people to report any signs of sexual abuse or other forms of violence against children and adolescents.

It is promoted by the Ministry of Children and Adolescents, with the support of Plan International Paraguay and other civil society organizations, including UNICEF, Children Believe, SOS Children Villages UNDP Paraguay, UNFPA, and the Yacyreta Binational Entity.

In 2022, efforts were focused on stressing that sexual abuse is not acceptable, raising awareness of the need to address the issue as something real, close and extremely serious, something that can neither keep happening nor go unpunished.

By focusing on the abuser, the aim was to further widen the scope of the reports against abusers. To represent the concept, we used something related to both children and fragility; something that can be shaped or destroyed in the same way: modelling clay.

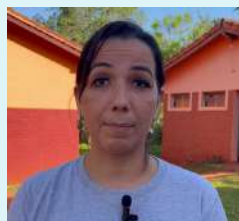
