

COUNTRY STRATEGY 2024 - 2028

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Foreword

Plan International has been working in Paraguay since 1994 to promote an inclusive, egalitarian society free from all forms of violence, especially against girls, female adolescents and women, through development programs and projects and by responding to humanitarian crises.

There are high levels of gender-based violence in the country, resulting in high rates of adolescent pregnancy, sexual abuse, marriages and forced and early unions, school dropouts and criadazgo [indentured child servants exploited for domestic labour]. These issues affect girls, female adolescents and young women in particular, and affect their ability to make decisions and influence their lives.

In light of these situations, Plan International Paraguay is committed to strengthening a society that ensures children's rights. We will work to ensure that children, adolescents and youth have knowledge and skills on protection against violence, live in safe environments free from harmful practices, make their own decisions about their lives and express their needs in emergency and humanitarian response scenarios.

Our goal is to see All Girls Standing Strong Creating Global Change.

We have more than 85 years of existence in the world, and we have made an impact on the lives of girls, boys, and adolescents in vulnerable situations in 70 countries.

We implement programmatic actions in over 330 communities across four departments in the eastern region of the country: San Pedro, Caaguazú, Guairá, and Paraguarí, reaching 25,000 sponsored girls and boys. In addition, we implement projects in areas of the Central department through grant funding and with the support of local partners.

Throughout this strategy, we will maintain the coverage area of the mentioned areas, and programmatic intervention may be expanded nationally in alignment with the allocation of additional funds and collaborative efforts."

Paraguay's context



Pregnancy in girls and adolescents 20.000

pregnancies are registered every day among girls and adolescents between the ages of 10 and 19.



Forced pregnancy of girls (10 to 14 years old) **2 GIRLS** aged 10 to 14 give birth every day.



Child sexual abuse **3.800**

reports last year. At least 9 cases of sexual abuse per day. 85% are girls and adolescents between the ages of 0 and 17.



Child marriages and forced and early unions (CMFEU)



cases reported between 2013 and 2019, of which 83% are girls.



School dropout

of children and adolescents do not complete school. 43.5% of indigenous children and adolescents between the ages of 14 and 17 do not attend school.
