Our Country Strategy

Plan International has been working in Paraguay since 1994 to promote an inclusive, egalitarian society free from all forms of violence, especially against girls, female adolescents and women, through development programs and projects and by responding to humanitarian crises.

There are high levels of gender-based violence in the country, resulting in high rates of adolescent pregnancy, sexual abuse, marriages and forced and early unions, school dropouts and criadazgo [indentured child servants exploited for domestic labour]. These issues affect girls, female adolescents and young women in particular, and affect their ability to make decisions and influence their lives.

In light of these situations, Plan International Paraguay is committed to strengthening a society that ensures children's rights. We will work to ensure that children, adolescents and youth have knowledge and skills on protection against violence, live in safe environments free from harmful practices, make their own decisions about their lives and express their needs in emergency and humanitarian response scenarios.

Our Ambition from now to 2028 is to see All Girls Standing Strong Creating Global Change.



Early childhood development

We aim for caregivers, mothers and fathers to incorporate positive and non-violent parenting styles, establish sensitive care for young children, as well as prevent, identify, and report instances of violations to ensure protective and violence-free environments. Additionally, we emphasize the importance of shared responsibility between men and women.



Impact

- A total of **1,887** mothers, fathers, caregivers, and teachers were trained in Positive Parenting and Parenthood.
- Furthermore, **8,972** men and women were indirectly impacted.

Girls, boys, and young people as agents of change

Training and participation processes in leadership.



40 technicians from the Departmental Education Offices of Caaguazú, Guairá, Paraguarí, and San Pedro received training on the protagonistic participation of children and adolescents. With Plan's assistance, the formation of School Councils in educational communities was facilitated.

In the Kuñatics project, girls and adolescents from rural communities received training on the correct use of digital resources for empowerment and participation.

Within the Regional Youth Program, local coordination was carried out with organizations such as the Committee of Young Citizens of Caraguatay, UNEPY, and Kuña Poty, who were strengthened with financial, administrative, and programmatic tools for better performance of their functions.

Impact

- 79,404 girls and boys were directly and indirectly benefited.
- 59,887 men and women were directly and indirectly benefited.

Protection from violence

Through Community
Protection Mechanisms,
we aim to strengthen
and train communities
for the prevention
of violence towards
children and
adolescents through
community gatherings.

In partnership with the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), over 100 key figures in the protection system, especially Public Defenders from the Ministry of Public Defense (MDP), were trained on the consequences of Early and Forced Marriages and Unions.

We supported the national campaign "Todos Somos Responsables" (We Are All Responsible) promoted by the Ministry of Childhood and Adolescence, focusing on the prevention of all types of violence against children and adolescents.

Impact

- 180,315 boys and girls were directly and indirectly benefited.
- 151,940 men and women were directly and indirectly benefited.



Skills and decent work



Sape'a 2.0 is a model programme for youth employment and entrepreneurship aimed at improving the social and economic situation of adolescents and young people in rural and urban areas of Paraguay. The initiative helps young people, especially women, overcome barriers and stereotypes that prevent

employment.

Participants developed business plans with greater potential for sustainability and growth. The best business and innovation plans were rewarded with seed capital.

Technical support was provided to entrepreneurs to enhance their production processes, assistance in obtaining external seed capital, creation of connections between entrepreneurs and other organisations for the sale of their products, training in marketing and finance, and workshops on association and cooperative work with indigenous youth engaged in honey production, among other initiatives.



In collaboration with the government of Taiwan, the Juventics initiative enabled the training of 70 women entrepreneurs in digital skills.

The opening of the Entrepreneurship Support Center (Centro de Atención a Emprendedores - CAE) in San Pedro, where entrepreneurs, especially women, can access workshops and training on innovation, digital marketing strategies, design thinking, digital education, among others.

Regarding the inclusion of people with disabilities, sensitization workshops were conducted to promote labor inclusion with the business sector. Additionally, support was provided to family members, work references, and young people to ensure their retention in employment positions.

Community-led enterprises led by indigenous individuals were also promoted. The intergenerational exchange activity with indigenous women, involving participants from different departments, resulted in the establishment of the indigenous coordination platform.

Likewise, processes of digital literacy were supported, and community actors were strengthened, implementing the caregiver curriculum and providing special support to women to enable them to receive training and start their own ventures.

Sexual and reproductive health and rights

Girls and young women have control over their lives and bodies.

We provided equipment and capacity-building support to 24 Friendly Clinics of the Ministry of Public Health and Social Welfare in Caaguazú, San Pedro, Guairá, and Paraguarí, where over 10,000 adolescents, mostly females, sought consultations.

Teachers from the Ministry of Education and Science were trained using the Zone Free of Pregnancy methodology and the guide "Mi cuerpo, mi cuerpito" (My Body, My Little Body).



Adolescent Clubs in rural communities were strengthened through the health system methodology via the Family Health Unit Network.

Work experience with adolescent boys aged 13 to 16, trained as Ambassadors of Comprehensive Sexuality Education, who replicated their knowledge to their peers, promoting and encouraging positive and non-violent masculinities.

The "Sanamente Adolescente" initiative addressed mental health, responding to the high demand for spaces to discuss the topic and the need to address mental health crises reported by young people in many communities.

Over 900 parents received information about changes in puberty, sexuality, adolescence, and the risks of teenage pregnancy, among other topics.

Collaboration with the Ministry of Education and Sciences in the development of a series of guides on the prevention of all types of violence against children and adolescents, aligned with the curriculum of each educational cycle and level.

Promotion through radio and television spots with messages regarding the prevention of child abuse, forced child marriage, and teenage pregnancy, aiming to raise community awareness about these issues.

Impact

- A total of 150,450 children and adolescents were directly and indirectly benefited.
- 130,143 men and women were directly and indirectly benefited.

Emergency Response

We provide a humanitarian response in emergency or conflict situations, aiming for children and adolescents to grow in resilient communities where their rights and dignity are respected before, during, and after any emergency.

Impact

- 1,727 children and adolescents were directly benefited.
- 7,491 men and women were directly and indirectly benefited.

International Day of the Girl

In the context of the International Day of the Girl, celebrated on October 11 under the theme "Girls Free from Violence," girls and adolescents from rural communities assumed roles of utmost authority for a day.

This initiative, supported by various sectors of the society, received active support from the media, influencers, and members of civil society. It achieved a significant impact, reaching nearly 3.5 million people through social media, traditional media, and public spaces.

As part of this campaign, 22 girls simultaneously assumed power during the meeting of the Council of Ministers of the Presidency of the Republic at the Palacio de López (Governance Palace). Several state institutions, civil society organizations, and businesses joined this symbolic gesture, temporarily yielding power to ensure that the voices and perspectives of girls were recognized and considered. In addition to the takeover in Asunción, similar events took place throughout the country, involving different sectors and raising awareness about the importance of listening to girls and adolescents in decision-making.
