Our support also extends to risk communication and mass awareness campaigns for waterborne diseases, ensuring that communities are equipped with the knowledge and resources needed to safeguard their well-being.

I am particularly proud of our efforts to develop a simple yet effective tool for local users and citizens, aiding in anticipatory actions during disasters. By harnessing early warning information from the Department of Hydrology and Meteorology (DHM), we have empowered communities to make science-based decisions, enhancing their resilience in the face of natural hazards such as landslides.

As we reflect on these achievements, let us renew our commitment to upholding the rights and dignity of girls and young people across Nepal. Together, we have made a significant impact, and I am confident that with continued collaboration and dedication, we will achieve even greater milestones in the days to come.



Impact of our programs in our main areas of development work

Early childhood development

All young children grow up well cared for and equally valued.



8,616 girls

under 18 years of age of a total of 135,779 people reached.

Inclusive quality education

Children, particularly girls, have the education they need to succeed in life.

Plan International has installed interactive learning kiosks in secondary schools in Nepal to help students improve their reading and English language skills. Students from different grades can use the digital kiosks to complete various learning modules on core subjects. Using interactive digital technology, the children's learning is self-guided and fun with engaging digital content and information through a user-friendly interface.

Highlights:

Five wards across five local governments being declared as Out-Of-School Children (OOSC) through OOSC campaigns.

Local governments were supported to draft local education plan, curriculum and policies whereas support was made to develop local education policies in six municipalities in Dolpa, two in Sindhuli and one in Dhanusha.

Young people driving change

Girls, boys and young people shape decisions that affect their lives by leading change within their own communities and influencing decisions at higher levels.

"Mostly when young people talk about politics, they don't really want to get involved because they think politics is dirty," explains Swastika, 19, who is from Sindhuli district and is currently at college in Kamalamai Municipality, studying political science.

In Nepal, it is common practice for political parties to visit local schools as part of their canvassing ahead of elections. Children as young as six are

targeted with propaganda and taught to support the parties that their schools or teachers are affiliated with. Swastika, who believes that politics can and should be a force for good, feels uncomfortable with children being used in this way. "School should be a safe space for children to get an education," she says.

Neha's message

"Being selected as one of 12 global youths and 3 from Asia Pacific to represent my country was surreal. During my 3-month internship with Plan International Global Hub and Nepal's Campaigns Team, I co-created youth-centered campaign strategies and led a global webinar on International Youth Day. Working with energetic leaders worldwide was empowering. I learned valuable lessons, especially in content creation, and witnessed Plan's commitment to ending inequalities for young girls globally. I'm honored to contribute to this vision and excited about the new youthcentered campaign strategies ahead."

Protection from violence

Children and young people, particularly girls, grow up free from violence, fear or discrimination.

Youth engagement is a vital aspect of Plan International Nepal's programmes which bring together young people from diverse backgrounds, developing their advocacy and leadership skills so they can become youth ambassadors and leaders in their communities.

"During events of child marriages, parents vehemently assert their autonomy, insisting that their children were marrying by choice and no intervention was necessary. Now if there are child marriages taking place, the parents and mothers are themselves raising their voices, saying that we have to stop the child marriages. I feel happy to see that change," says 20-years-old Rejina, Youth Ambassadors from Makwanpur.

Highlights:

The program played a role in forming, strengthening, and building the capacity of 98 Child Rights Committees (CRCs) at both ward and municipal levels.

Skills and decent work

Marginalised young people, especially young women, gain knowledge and skills, access opportunities and engage actively in decent work of their choosing.

Impact:

3103 young women

under 24 years of age out of a total 4079 people reached

"I feel happy to say that I am an excavator operator. I am one of very few women who have chosen a different profession, one

mainly dominated by men," says Sushma who has been working in the construction industry for the last few months after taking part in a training course supported by Plan International Nepal.

"Before joining the training, I didn't have any idea that women could also be construction workers and operate heavy equipment," says Sushma who joined the skills training programme along with nine other young women aged 18-24. "Among the ten of us, five now have jobs."

Highlights:

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We worked together with Ministry of Social Development and Health of Gandaki Province to strengthen Training and Employment Management System (TEMIS).

Under the Young Women Employment in Pokhara Project, the Hotel Association Nepal, Pokhara chapter, entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) that endorsed child protection, ethical hiring, and policies related to decent work.

Sexual and reproductive health and rights

Girls and young women have control over their lives and bodies

Impact:

16536 girls

under 18 years of age out of total of 46746 people reached.

Focusing on strengthening school-based SRH services through infrastructure support, including the construction of gender-friendly toilets and WASH facilities, the programme has constructed menstrual health management restrooms and adolescent friendly information corners in various schools in 11 districts.

"Before the menstrual health rooms were set up, we had to rush home when we got our periods. Now, Plan International has built menstruation restrooms here so whenever we have a stomach aches, we can go there and use hot water bottles to ease our pains. They also provide us with pads. Now, even if our clothes get stained with blood, we have somewhere we can get changed," says 14-year-old peer educator Pratima from Bardiya.

Highlights:

Policy support included the development of orientation package for Adolescent-Friendly Health Services (AFHS) and an orientation package for health providers on AFHS with gender-transformative approaches.

Humanitarian Response

715 people received humanitarian assistance in 2023. Nepal faced heavy rain in October 2022, with flooding and landslides in different parts of the country. Western Nepal was particularly badly affected, with Bardiya, Kalikot and Jumla districts among the most impacted. 6,000 households were damaged or completely destroyed, along with farmland.

Sarita, 17, lives with her six family members (two sisters, two brothers and parents) in Jumla, one of the most remote hill districts. The family depend on their farm for a living, however the floods damaged their crops so they were unable to harvest anything, leaving them without an income.

Plan International supported Sarita and her family with the provision of dignity kits to help them manage their personal hygiene. "The dignity kits included soap, sanitary pads, underwear, a towel, a solar torch, tooth paste and brush, safety pins, nail clippers and detergent, among other things," says Sarita.

Plan International Nepal established YouthHUB, a coalition of organizations that aims to offer youth activities and aspiring young leaders a space for ideation, interaction, and innovation. It is implemented with a focus on adolescents and youth, with special attention to girls and young women. This coalition is comprised of six organizations: Social Changemakers and Innovators (SPCHAI), We For Change, Hami DajuVai, Yuwalaya, YAV Nepal, and Yuwa.

Nepal is equipped with a robust set of laws about the inclusion of girls in politics and political decision-making; however, the effective translation of these legal provisions into tangible outcomes may not always be evident in practice: out of 753 municipalities in Nepal, for example, only 25 are currently led by women. YouthHUB's objective is to empower girls to take collective action for systemic social and political change, as well as to realise their sexual and reproductive health rights, which contribute to the realisation of human rights and gender equality.

From September 2022 to June 2023, the YouthHUB coalition members implemented various influencing, campaign, and communication activities in Plan Nepal's project implementation areas and Kathmandu Valley. Aligning with Plan International's Girls Get Equal campaign theme #EqualPowerNow, the six organisations worked under the theme of Girls in Politics. **Plan International Nepal** and YouthHUB's work can be divided into three workstreams: learning and engagement-based activities (creative workshops and training for girls); advocacy (with a special focus on the 2022 national elections); and digital advocacy (a social media campaign and podcast series).

Plan International Nepal's advocacy efforts extended to the "Dear Leaders" activity, encompassing a one-day event where girls had the opportunity to converse with a deputy mayor, addressing community concerns and sharing their perspectives. The discussions covered a range of issues, identifying challenges and highlighting the needs of young girls and women. A notable outcome of these interactions involved the signing of letters by the deputy mayor, pledging a commitment to enhancing the rights and overall well-being of young girls and women in their respective areas.

The final objective was to review the electoral manifestos of political parties running in the 2022 national elections. YouthHUB worked with girls to analyse these manifestos, and prepare a suggestion paper including girls' agendas such as ending CEFM, gender-friendly toilets, quality education, regular distribution of sanitary pads in schools and colleges, etc. This suggestion paper was delivered to the Central Office Secretary of the Nepali Congress, the Communist Party of Nepal (UML), the Communist Party of Nepal (Maoist Centre), and the parliamentarians.



WASH SDG project is funded by Dutch Government creating the WASH demand, improve community's behavior, improve institutional and community level sanitation, and improve governance for sustainability. Gender and Social Inclusion is the key component in the project. WASH SDG project applied gender and WASH monitoring tools to sensitize and monitor the gender outcomes. Gender and WASH Monitoring Tool is used to measure household workload of men and women, women's participation in community activities, leadership in community and decision making in household level WASH related activities. After receiving training from Plan International, Chiring from Nepal has been able to triple her income by making and selling reusable sanitary pads in her community. She is now a successful entrepreneur despite losing a leg as a young child.

"When I sell the pads, I provide all the information I learnt about good menstrual hygiene management to the girls and women who buy them. Before the training, I was doing unhygienic things like using dirty rags and hiding the soiled rags in dark places. I did not know I needed to change them frequently during my period," explains Chiring.

One Home One Reading Corner

"One Home, One Reading Corner" is a literacy promotion initiative aimed at fostering a reading culture within households.

The program encourages individuals and families to create dedicated spaces for reading in their homes.

It has been implemented with the support of Plan International, facilitated by KIRDARC Nepal, and coordinated with Narharinath Rural Municipality in Kalikot. Under the "Improving Reading and Writing Skills of Children in Kalikot" project, parents have established 724 reading corners, benefiting 1,120 children. Local materials like wood, mud, and paper are used to create furniture and decorations for these corners. The positive outcomes have led to additional reading corners set up by beneficiaries themselves.

Bimal says, "In the beginning, it was difficult to hold pencil. However, after serval attempts, I was able to grip the pencil with my foot. I was so happy when I first wrote the Nepali alphabet," he says.


Pahiro Alter-Landslide warning and response app

shares rain forecast data and ensure it is contextualised and actionable to affected communities and households. Together with the forecasts, it also provides household level categorisation and early action planning for landslides risks based on vulnerability and capacity so that anticipatory actions will be targeted on the basis of actual and specific needs considering exposure, gender, age, caste, and other specific identities of the affected population rather than taking a blanket approach. It is currently being piloted in Narharinath Rural Municipality, Kalikot.




