Throughout these four and a half decades, a rich narrative has been woven with achievements, overcome challenges, obstacles, and significant contributions to the country's development. This journey represents the elapsed time, the legacy of effort, perseverance and service to communities, transforming lives. This report represents Plan International's footprint and contribution to Guatemala, with a focus on children and youth, the sector of the population that gives us hope and the reason of the hard work we do. We want them to fully enjoy their rights more equitably and also leave a mark that transforms not only their lives, but also makes Guatemala a better country.







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EDITORIAL

An organization at the service of children, adolescents and young people does not commemorate 45 years every day and today we have the joy of celebrating it with you.

When we think about our trajectory, we see the faces of so many allies who along the way have joined Plan to carry out processes that positively transform the lives of children, adolescents and youth in Guatemala. Historically, this journey stems from a response to the needs of the population affected by the 1976 earthquake, and emphasizing community organization in rural areas with higher poverty rates. This process gave rise to child-centered community development approach, allowing Plan to specialize its focus on children, recognizing them as individuals with rights. This trajectory also allowed us to receive in 2009 the Order of the Quetzal, the highest honorary distinction awarded by the government of Guatemala. This was possible through coordinated work with the government as duty-bearer, civil society organizations, communities, children and young people to whom we owe ourselves.

Throughout this work and after years of research, Plan International globally highlighted the inequality that girls have faced in the full exercise of Human Rights. Consequently, the organization took advocacy actions at international level and with the United Nations Assembly. This is how, starting from the year 2012, October 11th was declared as the International Day of the Girl. In Guatemala, the effort did not stop there and for several years Plan, together with allied organizations, advocated for a reform of the civil code through decree 13-2017, which prohibits marriage under 18 years of age.

Our work at Plan has been adapted to all circumstances experienced by the country and this from that, in 1978, Plan International emerged, addressing the significant challenges

faced by one of the most vulnerable sector -children and young people-, who themselves are hope to this country. Our work promoted development projects for and by families and communities, responding to the needs of the most excluded population and includes an effective humanitarian response from day one, in emergencies, such as volcanic and seismic activities, tropical storms, as well as a pandemic. This made us confirm not only the vulnerability that existed in the world, but also the capacity we had as an organization to adapt and respond to 100% of sponsored communities and families. I would like to thank the entire team that has been part of the Plan family to carry out this work that has allowed us to transform lives. As well, I express my gratitude to their families for supporting and encouraging the service that each one provides, often going that extra mile.

Without the support of the duty-bearer, civil society organizations, families, communities, donors in Guatemala and around the world, as well as Plan's offices in other countries, this effort would be impossible to carry out. On behalf of children, adolescents and youth, we thank you for your support and conviction that together we will continue to transform lives and make Guatemala a better place.

I invite you to read this annual report, which shows the work that we, thanks to you, carried out between July 2022 and June 2023, as well as the main footprints left during these 45 years.





A more timely response to emergencies is provided. Local fundraising begins, in partnership with private companies and seeking the support of individual donors who join Plan's cause. Girls play a leading role in Plan's work, which responds to more than seven years of research on the situation of girls around the world. Plan proposes to the United Nations National Assembly the day of October 11 to be declared the International Day of the Girl Child, which has been commemorated since 2012, to highlight and raise awareness about the gap that girls experience in fully enjoying their rights compared to other groups and urgently call for investment in them.

Plan focuses its efforts on highlighting the situation of girls and the inequality they experience. Alliances and coordination with duty-bearers are consolidated. The management of funds from various countries increases its contribution to projects for children, adolescents and young people. Plan has a broad humanitarian work, considering issues such as food and nutritional security, population in human mobility, response to emergencies due to natural disasters, the pandemic, among others. There is an emphasis on working in partnership

with Civil Society Organizations, enhancing their strengthening.


